Current

Auckland Conservation Board: Member – appointed 1 January 2011 to 30 June 2013. Applied for Reappointment 1 July 2013.

Member of Committees – Chair: Liaison with Auckland Council; Member: Conservation Management Strategy Committee. The role of the Board is to advise the Department of Conservation (DOC) and the NZ Conservation Authority, and to provide interaction between DOC and the community.

Friends of the Auckland Botanic Gardens (2011 – current) : An elected member of the Executive Committee, with a particular interest in establishing an Epiphytum Conservatory in the Gardens – this will be a 5-10 year project to undertake planning, obtain all funding and consents for the structure. The role of the “Friends” is to provide membership to the public, support Gardens’ staff with volunteers, manage the botanical library, fundraise, plan events, purchase sculptures and other fixtures, provide scholarships to staff and plan events. The Friends contribute to significant structures e.g. the Visitor Centre. Incoming Trustee of the Friends of the Auckland Botanic Gardens Trust Board, representing the “Friends” (February 2013)

Friends of the Regional Parks (2012 – current) : An elected member of the Executive Committee, with a particular interest in liaising with the Auckland Conservation Board. The Friends of Regional Parks is an organisation formed by residents to work alongside Auckland Council and volunteer groups in the parks, as supporters and guardians of the regional park network in Auckland (38,000ha), providing vision and education, continuity, protection and a citizen's voice for the regional parks.

National Council of Women – Papakura Franklin Branch (2005 – current): Vice President/Action Item Convenor. Incoming President 2013. Member representing Business and Professional Women Franklin; Member of National Standing Committee for the Environment. Franklin Arts and Cultural Trust (1998-2005). Member appointed by Franklin District Council and made a **Life Member** in 2005. The Trust's role was to establish and manage a Franklin Arts and Cultural Centre, which has now been replaced with the Franklin: The Centre (Arts and Library combined), to implement the Arts and Cultural Policy (of which I had input) and to allocate funds provided by Franklin District Council and Creative NZ to fund Arts and Cultural Projects within the community.
